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## Come to the Spring Meeting at Salford

### Why Salford?

**S**ALFORD is a name of many memories to those members of our Society who are also members of the Schwenkfelder Church, for at Salford is a very old cemetery and one of the early churches of the settlers. Thus the spot is of importance to every descendant.

The spring meeting will be held on the grounds of this meeting-house, now used only once a year. In the burial ground nearby rest the bones of a large number of the original immigrants, some graves still unmarked. Revolutionary soldiers to the number of half a dozen or more also rest here. Their graves are unrecorded except in the official records, and their names are unknown. Not far away General Pulaski's army rested before the battle of Germantown. The spot is full of interest to every descendant of those valiant men and women who trudged out Germantown pike to hew a place for themselves on the hills and valleys back of and above Norristown.

The date is May 26, and the route will be marked. It is two miles northeast of Kulpsville. The church itself is off a dirt road a few hundred feet. Full directions appear with the regular invitations which have reached every member of the Society. It will be a meeting well worth while. It will be possible for all guests to return home for the evening meal. Many will bring box luncheons.
